

Today's celebration focuses on the mystery of the Eucharist, and the amazing memory of friends around a dinner table eating a Jewish ritual meal. The church stands in awe and reverence before the bread and wine that becomes the sacramental Body and Blood of Christ. Today the table of the altar is also a bridge – a bridge spanning the dangerous distance between God and us.

At the Last Supper, Jesus looked back to the Jewish tradition behind the Passover meal – the celebration of God's faithfulness in creating and saving the Jewish people from slavery. Jesus told his friends to dine together in remembrance of him. Every time believers gather to remember him, he becomes present in the Bread and Wine.



Jesus also looked to the future when he instituted the Eucharist. He spoke of a day when he would celebrate with all peoples in his Father's kingdom. Every Mass anticipates the eternal and future intimacy with God that will make heaven heavenly.

On this Feast of Corpus Christi, you are joined to all those in the Church around the world who long to gather but cannot because of the pandemic Covid-19 virus. Still, no illness, no language, culture, or national boundary can be a barrier great enough to block the bridge that is the table of the Lord. Like family members coming to the dinner table from various rooms in the house, the table of the Lord unites God's families across the globe.

At the same time, belief in the Eucharist has become a problem for some Catholics. There are those who find it difficult to believe that somehow Christ is really alive and present as the Bread of Life. Why? It could be that some people no longer have any personal, immediate experience of God.

What is an example? Consider what happens when a dog sees a rabbit. It eagerly chases the bunny, barking for joy. Other dogs hear the barking and start chasing, too. But after a while they quit – because they haven't seen any rabbit, they've only been chasing a barking dog who originally saw a rabbit. Is it any wonder that people give up the chase? When they realize they are living on other people's faith, they give up. They have not yet personally met God.

Another problem with the Eucharist is that it celebrates an event that is 2000 years old. How can you realistically expect to have an experience from something that happened so long ago? Of course, the answer is "memory." Unless you keep refreshing the vivid memory of how Jesus lived, what he taught, how he died for love and returned to live as a person beyond mortality, receiving Holy Communion becomes little more than an empty ritual and fuzzy recollection. Something that happened to somebody else.

Memory works the same way a kiss works. You can analyze the mechanics of a kiss, measure the pheromones exuded, gauge the motion of the muscles involved – but none of that conveys how a kiss feels – or what a kiss means. You could write a 500-page dissertation on the essence of a kiss and still not know its meaning. To consider how a kiss works while engaging in one would really miss it's magic. A kiss ultimately delivers its magic only when you lean into it and let yourself go.

Holy Communion is a person's most intimate, physical contact with the risen Christ. Holy Communion is the kiss of God. The best way to enjoy it is just to lean into it and let yourself go.

True, there is a great divide in the human family, more dangerous and persistent than distances of time and space. It is the gap that separates people from one another and from God. What can you do to bridge this gap? Not a thing. Not a single thing. The human race is trapped on an Alcatraz Island of their own unbelief, grudges, and resentments.

So God did what people could not do for themselves. He built a bridge, and the cost was steep. The bridge would come at the cost of God's own son's life. During the pandemic, we cannot attend Mass together. But in your memory, come to the bridge, to the table of God's love. This is not a private meal God caters to be eaten in solitude, as if for a lonely business traveler eating room service in a hotel. This is the banquet of joy to be shared with everyone around the table. Come across the bridge to the oasis of joy and belonging. It is the one true destination that everyone will eventually recognize as home.

It's time to register for Vacation Bible School!



FIRST RECONCILIATION & COMMUNION FOR 2ND GRADERS

This has been quite a year so far and you are probably wondering about Sacramental Preparation for your child in 2020-2021. In a typical year we would begin preparation in early September and meet in person weekly to prepare for First Reconciliation in late fall. The health and well-being of our children, parents, priests and catechists are foremost in our minds and we are monitoring the situation. If we cannot provide our typical program this fall we have two alternative options for preparation:

Option 1) Home-study - materials will be provided to those families interested in this option and the parish will provide weekly parental support for guiding you in your home preparation.

Option 2) Defer – wait one year and your child can prepare for the sacraments in a communal setting with typical classes and communal gatherings.

Welcome to the last week of school! On Tuesday, we celebrated our 29 graduates in a drive-in parking lot ceremony with an estimated 175 in attendance via zoom. On Friday, we waved to the last of our kids picking up their things and collecting yearbooks as they head into a well-deserved summer break after months of learning in quarantine.

Conversations on staff and in classes have been powerful this last week as we've witnessed peaceful protests and violence in our community in the wake of the murder of George Floyd. Racial diversity is a strength of our school, where 31% are students of color: almost 10% more than the demographics of Portland. When we talk about racial justice with our students, it's not about out

there: it's about right here and who we are now. It is about the safety of people we love, especially our boys

of color.

As we depart for summer, we say again to our students and ourselves: build a just and compassionate world. As a community, we renew our commitment to solidarity, inclusion and systemic change for equity and justice. We pray for the families of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery and Breonna Taylor.
